## Year Groups - Curriculum Updates



### Reception

We have learnt so much in what has been a very busy half-term! Our themes 'Hello Autumn', 'Nocturnal Animals' and 'Christmas' have provided us with a range of learning opportunities across all areas of the EYFS curriculum. The children particularly enjoyed the 'Owl Babies' story. We also introduced the children to non-fiction texts so we could find out more information about barn owls and other nocturnal animals.

The children have been doing a fantastic job of learning the sounds and actions in phonics. They have enjoyed meeting all the animals in Anima Phonics and we are amazed at how quickly they are learning to blend the sounds for reading. Now we have completed the first Anima Phonics unit, the children are also being encouraged to use their sound knowledge in their writing.

In maths, we have been looking carefully at the composition of numbers to five. The children have developed a deeper understanding of how the numbers to five can be made.

We have also had a wonderful trip out to the theatre to watch 'The tiger Who Came to Tea'. We were so proud of all the children they listened carefully and enjoyed every part of the show.

Finally, I would like to congratulate our EYFS children and staff on the fantastic performance of our Nativity. I hope you are feeling as proud as the EYFS team are.

We would like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. We look forward to welcoming the children back for the spring term in January 2026.

### Year 1

What a busy but exciting term it has been! The children have worked incredibly hard and enjoyed a wide range of learning experiences.

In science, we explored materials and carried out investigations to find out whether different objects are waterproof, tough or absorbent. The children loved testing materials and making predictions.

In history, the class learned about their own personal history by creating timelines and thinking about how they themselves are part of history being made today.

In RE, the children enjoyed learning about the lead-up to Christmas and how Christians prepare for this special celebration.

In art, we have been developing our pencil-drawing skills by experimenting with pressure and different types of lines. This led to the children creating wonderful self-portraits in the style of Paul Klee. We are very proud of their creativity!

The classes have also enjoyed their sessions at Forest School, especially learning how to safely light fires. We have been practising new songs for our Christmas Nativity, and the children were very excited to share their performance with you.

This term we were visited by the Fire Department who taught the children about fire safety, including the important "Stop, Drop and Roll" technique. It has truly been a fantastic term full of learning, exploration and fun.

Well done to all the children for their enthusiasm and hard work.

## Year 2

It has been a busy and enjoyable term in year 2. Our Year 2 children have continued to make meaningful progress this term across all areas of the curriculum.

In English, they have explored a range of writing genres and are growing more confident in choosing the right style for different purposes. Highlights have included writing non-chronological reports linked to WW1 - where the children enjoyed gathering facts and making notes - and narrative writing, where they created and described their own characters.

During reading sessions, we have focused on strategies to support strong comprehension and discussed how these skills help improve their writing by thinking carefully about the reader.

In maths, we have covered place value, addition and subtraction, and are now working on shape. The children have practised a variety of methods to solve calculations and are developing greater fluency in their work.

In geography, the children learned the seven continents and five oceans, and were able to describe physical and human features in places near and far from the equator. In

history, they particularly enjoyed our unit on *How We Learned to Fly*, taking on the roles of eyewitnesses, reporters and significant figures in aviation history.

This term's DT work has focused on stable structures and the children are now preparing to design and create a chair for Baby Bear. In science, we explored habitats and microhabitats. The children carried out an investigation to find out which habitat woodlice prefer, recording their observations in a table.

We finished the term with Nativity rehearsals. The children enjoyed practising at the church and were delighted to perform for you all.

We would like to wish you a restful and Merry Christmas and a happy, healthy New Year.

Winnie is training at both the Infants and the Juniors and is following the 'PAWS Therapy' dog training, which is the UK's leading programme for schools.

Mrs Dagley is our handler at the Infant school and has introduced Winnie to work with children on a Tuesday morning, along with Mrs Dolman, our handler from the Junior School.

Winnie has helped lots of our children so far and, in turn, the children help support Winnie's training. Winnie has enjoyed sharing group stories and outdoor play with years 1 and 2, and has recently visited our Foundation Stage classrooms.

## Online Safety - Keeping Children Safe on New Devices



As many children receive new digital devices around this time of year, it's important for families to take a few minutes to set up **parental controls** before they start exploring. Parental controls help protect children online by limiting access to age-inappropriate content, managing screen time and ensuring safer communication.

The poster included in this newsletter—created by **National Online Safety**—offers simple, practical instructions for setting up parental controls on popular devices such as iPhones, Android phones, PlayStations, Xbox consoles, Chromebooks, Windows PCs, Macs and Smart TVs. Each section explains what steps parents can take to keep their child safe while still allowing them to enjoy their new technology.

We encourage all families to review these tips and check the settings on any new or existing devices at home. A few small adjustments can make a big difference in helping children stay safe, responsible and confident as they navigate the digital world.

## PE and Sport



The children have had a productive and enjoyable term in PE and school sports. In our games sessions with Mr Probert, they have been developing key skills invasion sports, focusing particularly on uni-hoc and ball-handling techniques that support progression towards basketball and netball.

During class teacher PE, the children have been exploring dance. They have responded well to a variety of themes used as stimuli and have worked collaboratively in pairs to create and refine their own routines. After half term, we will be returning to gymnastics, where the

children will work towards the skills needed for an upcoming gymnastics competition that some Year 2 pupils will have the opportunity to enter.

We were also pleased to have a group of children represent the school in a Boccia tournament at Green Towers in Hinckley. They performed exceptionally well and achieved second place, scoring highly against the other teams.

## School Council



At the beginning of the school year, all Year 1 and 2 classes elected two new school councillors to represent them at school council meetings with Mrs Barwell. The school council regularly discuss ways to make our school even better and takes on roles of responsibility to promote national events and represent Burbage C of E Infants in the community.

### Anti-bullying Week

As a school, we always support Anti-Bullying Week. The theme this year was 'Power for Good' and the children completed activities to support their understanding of what bullying is and what we can do to stop it. We use the word '**STOP**' to help the children to understand that bullying is unkind words or actions *Several Times On Purpose* and that they need to *Start Telling Other People*.

The school councillors have also promoted our charity work. They took it in turns to visit all classes daily to sell poppies to support the work of The Royal British Legion. Thank you to everyone who donated to this.

**Need help fast?**

**Right Care, Right Place**

**Step 1:** Try to manage the problem yourself or get help from a local pharmacy, NHS 111 online, or the NHS App.

**Step 2:** If that doesn't work or the problem is more serious, contact your GP practice or NHS 111 (when your GP practice is closed). They will help arrange the right appointment.
